**2. Patron:** Kilgore

**3. Committee:** Passed both houses

**4. Title:** Careless driving; vulnerable road users.

**5. Summary:** The proposed legislation amends § 46.2-816.1 to add causing the death of a vulnerable road user to the definition of careless driving, which is a Class 1 misdemeanor. Current law only includes the injury of a vulnerable road user in this definition. The bill also amends § 46.2-392 to add careless driving to the list of crimes where the court is authorized to suspend the driver's license or restrict the driver's license of a person for up to six months. Current law only authorizes the court to suspend or restrict a driver's license for reckless or aggressive driving.

**7. Fiscal Impact Estimates:** Final.

**8. Fiscal Implications:** Implementation of the proposed legislation could result in more individuals being convicted of a Class 1 misdemeanor for careless driving. Anyone convicted of a Class 1 misdemeanor is subject to a sentence of up to 12 months in jail and a fine of not more than \$2,500, either or both.

However, any increase in jail population will increase costs to the state. The Commonwealth currently pays the localities \$4.00 a day for each misdemeanor or otherwise local-responsible prisoner held in a jail. It also funds a large portion of the jails' operating costs, e.g. correctional officers. The state's share of these costs varies from locality to locality. However, according to the Compensation Board's most recent Jail Cost Report (November 2021), the estimated total state support for local jails averaged \$37.58 per inmate, per day in FY 2020.
