3. Committee: Commerce and Labor

4. Title: Workers' compensation; time period for filing claim; certain cancers.

5. Summary: Provides that the time period for filing a workers' compensation claim for certain cancers is two years after a diagnosis of the disease is first communicated to the employee or within 10 years from the date of the last injurious exposure in employment, whichever first occurs. Under current law, such time period is two years after a diagnosis of the disease is first communicated to the employee or within five years from the date of the last injurious exposure in employment, whichever first occurs.

8. Fiscal Implications: The Virginia Workers' Compensation Commission expects the proposed legislation will not have a fiscal impact for the agency.

The Department of Human Resource Management's Office of Workers' Compensation expects the proposed legislation will not have a fiscal impact for its program or the workers' compensation unit at the Office of the Attorney General and Department of Law, which litigates the state's workers' compensation claims. The change in the statute of limitations is also unlikely to have a fiscal impact for state agencies in the workers' compensation program.
