5.	Summary: Repeals sections of the Code pertaining to substantial risk orders. Under current law, a Commonwealth's attorney or law enforcement officer may apply to a judge or magistrate for such an order to prohibit a person who poses a substantial risk to himself or others from purchasing or possessing a firearm. The bill removes a requirement that the Department of State Police (VSP) maintain a registry for the entry of such orders, and it repeals the Code section that makes it a Class 1 misdemeanor for the subject of such an order to purchase or possess a firearm.

8.	Fiscal Implications: Under current law, anyone convicted of a Class 1 misdemeanor is subject to a sentence of up to 12 months in jail and a fine of not more than \$2,500, either or both. Any potential fiscal impact on local and regional jails, or on the Commonwealth's Literary Fund, where such fines are deposited, is indeterminate at this time.
